From Plato to the Modern Era



 - LW: Well, no one is perfect, and it's unrealistic and unfair to expect perfection from someone. It's more essential to find someone who shares your values, respects you, and assists you in becoming the best version of yourself.
- MS: And once we've found someone, how can we discern whether it's "love" or mere "infatuation"?
 - LW: The boundary between infatuation and love can be blurry. Generally, infatuation can be characterized as an intense, often fleeting passion, while love is deeper and more enduring. Love involves not just passion but intimacy and commitment as well..
- **MS:** Sounds like a science in itself. But what about the opposite? How do we recognize when a relationship isn't working anymore?
 - LW: There are signs that a relationship might be in trouble, such as constant conflict, lack of communication, emotional or physical distancing, and feeling unhappy or unfulfilled. It's crucial to recognize these issues and either address them or, in some instances, realize it may be best to part ways.
- MS: A challenging subject, but necessary to discuss. Would you say that a breakup is always a failure?

 - LW: Oh, that's a tough question! There are so many I adore. But if I had to choose, perhaps "Pride and Prejudice" by Jane Austen. 
I hope that you are able to give and receive love in a way that fulfills you and allows you to grow. I hope that you never take love for granted, but always cherish and nurture it, as I do today.

Albert, thank you so much for your candid and profound insights. It is refreshing and inspiring to look at love through the lens of science.


Einstein:


Casanova:

Turing:



"That's our love, Peter. So far away, so small in the infinity of the universe, and yet it shines. And as long as it shines, so does our love."










Her Mexican roots were a proud part of her identity and strongly influenced her artistic work. In a globalized world where cultural boundaries are blurring, Kahlo could carry on this tradition and use her platform to share the Mexican culture and rich stories of her homeland. Her art could be a unique blend of traditional and modern elements, a declaration of love for her past and a vision for the future.

In addition, Kahlo was an unabashed pioneer of subjects that were considered taboo in her time. She addressed her sexual identity, her health problems, and her unconventional relationship with her husband Diego Rivera. It is very likely that she would continue in that role in today's more open society. Perhaps she would be a prominent activist for LGBTQ+ rights, an advocate for sexual freedom and diversity, and a voice for those struggling with physical and mental health issues.
